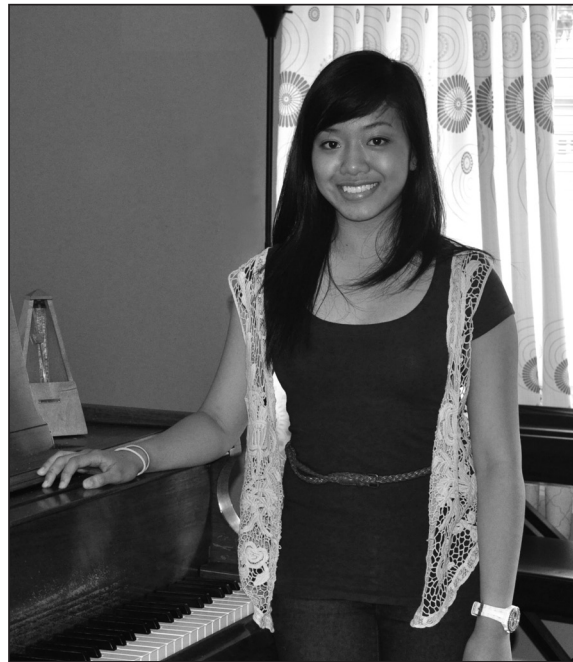


## Grand Scholarship Winner has History with PSF

Since the founding of the Piano Santa Foundation, very few students have been awarded multiple scholarships. Tram Bui, the 2011 Grand Scholarship winner, is one of those remarkable young musicians.

Even before Tram's family moved to Oregon in 2004, she had already established that she had a gift for music. After watching her father, who had been playing guitar since he was 13, and her older brother, who played the keyboard, Tram started group keyboard lessons. Shortly thereafter, she won a keyboard competition sponsored by Yamaha. She remembers never having had "as much interest in anything" as in music.

After her family immigrated to the United States from Vietnam, they looked for a way to continue her music education, and eventually found their way to the Piano Santa Foundation. "This was one of the best things that I had never imagined to have happen to me," says Tram about her Standard Scholarship. She later held the Stepping Stone Scholarship from 2009 until 2011. It was then, at the age of 16, that she became the latest PSF Grand Scholarship winner, making her only the third person in history to have held three different PSF scholarships. And as anyone

who has attended the last several PSF student recitals knows, Tram has developed into an extraordinary musician.

Today, she serves as the vice-president of her high school class, and is in National Honor Society (with a 3.94 GPA) at Grant High School in Portland. Tram accompanies both her church choir and her high school choir, the Royal Blues, and still finds time to practice piano two hours on most days! She emphasizes the importance of sticking with practice, despite the distractions. "In a student's teenage years, it becomes harder to keep it up and persevere," but she is quick to assure that "music helps your memory, and makes your inner self stronger.

Even if it doesn't end up being your interest, it can help you find your interest."

Tram hopes someday to at least minor in music, and to continue to be an example for other young artists. "Music doesn't only help you grow as a musician," she notes, "but it also makes you into a more mature person. It helps your memory, it helps your discipline, and it helps you learn to interact with other people." Ultimately, Tram believes she is headed to Pre-Med or Biology as a major because of her interest in the life sciences.

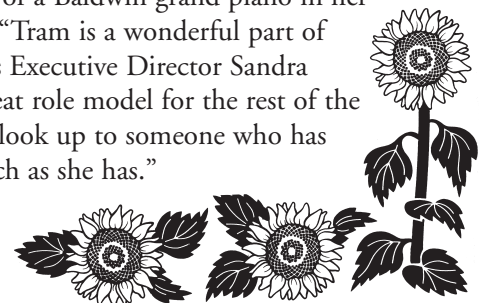
For winning the Grand Scholarship competition, Tram was awarded the use of a Baldwin grand piano in her home for two years. "Tram is a wonderful part of the PSF family," says Executive Director Sandra Phadke. "She is a great role model for the rest of the students. It's easy to look up to someone who has accomplished as much as she has."

# PSF Music Library Reaches 1500 Titles!

Mendelssohn's *Songs without Words*, highlights from *The Lion King*, and *The Gershwin Collection* are just a few of the new titles available in the PSF Music Library. The Library Committee has recently finished the process of adding new titles and cataloging a large number of new donations. As a result, the PSF Music Library has now reached approximately 1500 titles.

PSF Board Member Phillis Whitmore and the volunteers of the Library Committee meet for several hours every few months to catalog new donations. Says committee member Dawn Bergstrom, "It's great that our community is so generous with their donations; it has been a big project but hasn't really felt like work to me." Dawn adds "I love looking at music books... they're like reading novels and inspire me to play my piano more at home!"

Thanks to a generous grant, PSF was also able to fill a large gap in its offerings by purchasing a number of urtexts (unabridged, unedited versions of a composer's manuscripts), including the Beethoven Sonatas and Chopin Etudes.

Because urtexts and other advanced classical titles are more

expensive than the more common popular music compilations, it is especially important for PSF to have a large selection in our Library. Many students would have difficulty obtaining these types of books on their own.

"Now that the Library has expanded," says PSF Executive Director Sandra Phadke, "we also want to start looking at offering it as a resource to other community organizations." PSF hopes to partner with local arts and music nonprofits in the coming year.

The Library is available by appointment, and during student events each year, to all PSF students, their families, mentors and sponsors, as well as all former PSF students and their families.

### PSF Program Basics

PSF was created in 1994 to provide music education opportunities for children, particularly in underserved populations, in the Portland metropolitan area. The three main focuses of our programming are

- (1) **Scholarships:** placing pianos in students' homes,
- (2) **First Step and Second Step Keyboard Programs:** offering group piano lessons to elementary-aged children, and
- (3) **Placement Grants:** placing pianos with deserving community organizations.

In support of these programs, we provide in-home piano tunings and maintenance, offer educational opportunities, and sponsor student recitals throughout the year. Please see our website for information.

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# West Women's and Children's Shelter Receives PSF Piano Placement Grant

In 2011, PSF awarded the use of a piano to the Salvation Army West Women's and Children's Domestic Violence Shelter. This was the latest in a series of similar grants to local organizations in furtherance of PSF's mission of "enriching life through music."

For more than 30 years, the West has been serving victims of domestic violence in the Portland area. The shelter's mission is to "create a safe nurturing environment for survivors to realize their potential for healing and growth as we work together to end domestic violence." Having had the PSF piano for almost a year (as of press time), the West reports that they use it for resident parties, volunteer luncheons, and visiting performers. In the future, they also hope to expand their offerings to include music therapy in their children's program.

Residents at the West also use the PSF piano for personal

use. Especially those that have had a past history with playing piano, says the shelter's Director, Fay Schuler. "The piano helps them reconnect with their identity."

As a longtime victims' rights advocate, new PSF Board Member Trish Flanagan feels, "bringing a sense of joy and beauty into such a crisis-oriented environment is a wonderful way for our organization to contribute to the community."

Piano Placement Grants are a major part of the Piano Santa Foundation's programming (along with our student scholarships and the First Step Keyboard Program). Over the years, PSF pianos have resided at Portland-area organizations such as Camp Angelos, Arin's House, the Hill House, and the De Paul Treatment Center, to name a few.
